## Exploring Brazilian Gender Disparities Among Surgical, Anesthetic, and Obstetric Providers over 5 Years

Utilizing data from the Brazilian Demografia a nationwide study of Brazilian physicians we looked at the increase in female representation across 16 Surgical Anesthesia and Obstetric specialties over 5 years Women are still underrepresented in SAO specialties in Brazil 80% of 16 SAO specialties were predominantly male Since 2010 >50% of graduating physicians are female in Brazil Neurosurgery, Urology and Orthopedics had the lowest female representation Over the 5-year period the 3 specialties above also had the lowest increase in female representation Gender inequity in SAO pecialties is a multifactorial oblem however mentorship may play a key role Has this increase correlated to the female SAO providers in the last 5 years?

## Where are the women speakers at Brazilian surgical events?

Using the current online date from the Brazilian College of Surgeons calendar, we investigated the gender of the speakers at several events, such as congresses and conferences, from August 2013 through May 2020. The Brazilian College of Surgeons was chosen because it is the largest entity of surgeons in Latin America. A binomial test was performed with SPSS statistics.



Women make up 45,6% of all physicians in Brazil.

When it comes to the proportion of speakers in surgical specialty conferences, women represent only 28.4% in countries like Canada and the United States.



Therefore, we aimed to verify the proportion of female speakers at surgical events held in Brazil.

192 events had available information.



In these events there were 4066 speakers, only 13.11% of these were women.

There is an extremely significant difference between women and men (p<000)



80 events (41,67%) had zero female representation, whereas events without male representation were in the minority (5,21%).

Women are underrepresented as speakers in Brazilian surgical conferences, with even smaller representation than in similar events in other countries.

An university issue: where are the women in Brazilian surgery departments?

In order to verify the gender distribution in surgery departments in Brazil, we analyzed the gender from both department chairs and faculty members of the surgery division in 32 Brazilian medical schools in 2020. A binomial test CI 95% through IBM SPSS was performed to evaluate the data.





The women have equal access to medical education in Brazil and count as 45.6% (2017) of Brazilian physicians<sup>1</sup>.

However, in **surgery**, women are still **underrepresented**, as they are only 21% in general surgery or 2.2 to 40.7% depending on the surgical subspecialty in Brazil (2017)<sup>1</sup>.

Considering that the position of professor is an important parameter within academia, our aim was to assess the gender distribution among professors from federal universities in Brazil within the surgical departments.



Out of 32 medical schools evaluated, 25 provided the name of surgery.

Only 3 out of 25 surgery departments had woman as chair of the department.







Only **43** out of the **383** surgical professors available were women (11.23%), **340** (88.77%) were men (p<0.001).









There is huge gap between female and male academic representation in the surgery field.

Therefore, further studies are needed to qualitatively assess which barriers women surgeons in Brazil face to achieve such positions
